1. Committee members recorded as present were: Mr. Patrick Johnson, Chairman; Mr. Irving Comeaux, Mr. Ron Alcorn, Mr. Michael Dias, Mr. Chris Carter, Mr. Myron Matherne.  
Other Police Jurors recorded as present were: Mr. Jeff Naquin, Mr. Jamie Ponville, Mr. Leroy Blanchard.
2. Committee member Michael Dias offered a motion, seconded by Mr. Chris Carter, "THAT, the committee approve to pay bills submitted through September 3, 2021." The motion was unanimously adopted.
3. Chairman Patrick Johnson recognized the Secretary-Treasurer, who stated that Postlethwaite & Netterville, APAC is our annual auditors and we went out for RFP for audit services and they were the only firm to submit a bid. The bid amount was \$72,950 which was up from last year's price of \$67,950 however, last year the State waived the standard auditing procedures and this year it was incorporated back in.
4. Committee member Irving Comeaux offered a motion, seconded by Mr. Myron Matherne, "THAT, the committee approve and accept the bid of \$72,950 submitted by Postlethwaite & Netterville, APAC for the RFP for audit services." The motion was unanimously adopted.
5. Committee member Chris Carter offered a motion, seconded by Mr. Myron Matherne, "THAT, the committee approve to renew the agreement with Business & Career Solutions Center, Work Connection, Inc. and authorize the President to sign the necessary documents." The motion was unanimously adopted.
6. Committee member Chris Carter offered a motion, seconded by Mr. Michael Dias, "THAT, the committee add the following matters to the agenda." The motion was unanimously adopted.
7. Chairman Patrick Johnson recognized the Secretary-Treasurer, who stated that an emergency declaration is needed for mosquito abatement for aerial spraying and approval for cancellation of all events scheduled at the APCC through December 31, 2021 and release of all rental fees.
8. A brief discussion was held regarding the cancellation of all events at the APCC. In response, the OHSEP Director stated that the FEMA process has to occur and a method for temporary housing has to be set up to get the people out of the shelter. He stated that there are residents from Lafourche, Terrebonne and Orleans therefore, it will take some time to get these people relocated. He stated that there are 96 people in the shelter as of today but the number is fluctuating. He then stated that he spoke with the Event Center Coordinator and informed her that there will be several more months of this being a functioning shelter run by Red Cross and then the process of the repair side shall begin. He further stated that the request for assistance to repair the facility will be made to FEMA and can't be done until the center is empty of evacuees. The OHSEP Director stated that this is also a process to qualify and then the work needs to be done. He then stated that he and the Event Coordinator discussed cancelling until the end of the year or longer and informing those that have upcoming bookings. In response, he stated that if FEMA can relocate all the people in temporary housing within a month, the timeline for the end of the year is a good prediction. He also stated that if it extends past that time, it would be that much longer into the next year. He added that the recovery time is at least 1 year. He also stated that reimbursement for loss of revenue from FEMA can be a tricky subject to make a determination. A brief discussion was then held regarding temporary housing and the time span.
9. President Patrick Johnson requested comments, questions or concerns regarding the emergency declaration for the Mosquito Abatement Aerial spraying. Following three (3) calls, there were no comments received.
10. Committee member Michael Dias offered a motion, seconded by Mr. Chris Carter, "THAT, the committee approve and authorize as extreme emergency declaration for Mosquito Abatement Aerial LLC spraying, and accept lowest quote submitted and authorize the President to sign the contract." The motion was unanimously adopted.
11. President Patrick Johnson requested comments, questions or concerns regarding the cancellation of all events scheduled at the APCC through December 31, 2021 and authorize renter reimbursements on Friday, September 10, 2021. Following three (3) calls, there were no comments received.
12. Committee member Chris Carter offered a motion, seconded by Mr. Michael Dias, "THAT, the committee approve cancellation of all events scheduled at the APCC through December 31, 2021." The motion was unanimously adopted.

13. Committee member Chris Carter offered a motion, seconded by Mr. Irving Comeaux, "THAT, there being no further business to come before the Finance Committee, the meeting be adjourned." The motion was unanimously adopted.

Engineering/Grants Committee Meeting

1. Members recorded as present were: Mr. Irving Comeaux, Chairman; Mr. Leroy Blanchard, Mr. Ron Alcorn, Mr. Michael Dias, Mr. Jamie Ponville, Mr. Patrick Johnson.  
Other Police Jurors recorded as present were: Mr. Jeff Naquin, Mr. Chris Carter, Mr. Myron Matherne.
2. Chairman Irving Comeaux recognized committee member Leroy Blanchard, who stated that Mr. Loseke of GIS requested that he let the Jury know that since the hurricane, they have suspended all survey operations and are not charging any time. He also stated that within a couple of weeks they should be back on schedule.
3. Chairman Irving Comeaux stated that he would like to apply for levee protection for the residents behind Gerald St. He also requested that the Parish Engineer be authorized to assist with applying for a Corp of Engineers permit.
4. Committee member Jamie Ponville offered a motion, seconded by Mr. Ron Alcorn, "THAT, the committee approve and authorize the Parish Engineer to apply for a Corp of Engineers permit for a protection levee behind Gerald St." The motion was unanimously adopted.
5. Chairman Irving Comeaux recognized the OHSEP Director, who stated that the Office of Public Health is doing a clinic on Thursday, September 9, 2021 for those that have received their 1<sup>st</sup> shot and waiting for the 2<sup>nd</sup>.from 4 p.m.- 6 p.m. He then stated that the positive rate percentage for last week was 14.5% which is much lower than the previous week however, it's still in the high range of 55 or less. He also stated that the positive cases for the parish are 3,409 and deaths 51. The OHSEP Director stated that everyone in the APCC from the hurricane is being tested to control any spread that could occur. He also listed the many precautions that are taking place to keep everyone as safe as possible.
6. The OHSEP Director proceeded with an update on the Disaster Recovery Grants. He stated that all of the gas meters were received before the hurricane. He then thanked the Parish Engineer as well as committee member Leroy Blanchard and several others for actually working in the field to get these generators up and running. He stated that this process is on schedule but with everything that has occurred we are running under the emergency situation not the legal load testing. In response, the Parish Engineer stated that while doing this there were many punch list items that need to be addressed before final acceptance is given. He stated that if not for the Police Jury employees, the generators may not have been up and running. He added that this emergency situation helped point out a lot of the punch list items and other minor things that need to be addressed. In response to the engines for the gas pumps, the Parish Engineer stated that a report was provided to the Jury and the Jury voted to repair two (2) and the others on an as needed basis.
7. Chairman Irving Comeaux recognized the OHSEP Director, who stated that Assumption Parish has qualified for individual assistance allowing residents to apply for FEMA assistance. He stated that on the government side the Parish is also declared through public assistance in category A (debris removal) & B (emergency protective measures). He then stated an estimate for parks, etc. has to be submitted to FEMA to be declared. He stated that the process has started for those and it's possible that we will be declared. The OHSEP Director stated that DOTD is doing the State highways for debris pick up and the Parish is doing the parish roads. He stated that the sight on Ezekiel St. is up and running. He then stated that Assumption Parish is fortunate and unfortunate with power outages and some damages but Hurricane Ida was projected to pass over Assumption Parish but shifted easterly in the last 24 hrs. He also added that Assumption Parish has been included in the Blue Roof Program and encouraged anyone needing the assistance to please sign up. He further stated that FEMA will open a DSA (Disaster Survivor Assistant Site) allowing people to meet with FEMA representatives to sign up for the process. The APCC site is for the shelter and the general public.
8. Committee member Jamie Ponville offered a motion, seconded by Mr. Leroy Blanchard, "THAT, there being no further business to come before the Engineering Committee, the meeting be adjourned." The motion was unanimously adopted.

Regular Meeting  
Of the

Wednesday, September 8, 2021  
6:00 O'clock p.m.

1. The Regular Meeting of the Assumption Parish Police Jury was called to order by Police Jury President Patrick Johnson in the Police Jury Chambers located at 4813 Highway 1, Napoleonville, Louisiana.
2. Police Jurors recorded as present were: Mr. Ron Alcorn, Ward 1; Mr. Jeff Naquin, Ward 2; Mr. Irving Comeaux, Ward 3; Mr. Patrick Johnson, Ward 4; Mr. Michael Dias, Ward 5; Mr. Chris Carter, Ward 6; Mr. Leroy Blanchard, Ward 7; Mr. Jamie Ponville, Ward 8; Mr. Myron Matherne, Ward 9.
3. President Patrick Johnson led the Prayer and Police Juror Chris Carter led the Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag.
4. President Patrick Johnson recognized the Secretary-Treasurer, who stated that no complaints were received but due to the mail situation she asked if this could have prevented the office from receiving any. In response, a representative for the Assessor stated that they received no calls regarding. The Assessor then informed the Jury that they will be collecting approximately the same amount as last year and the Police Jury will be receiving \$882,708 if everyone pays their taxes without change orders. He then stated that the case with Brine Wells was loss at the tax commission and appealed it at the district court here in the Parish and it ruled in the Assessor's favor. He then stated that Brine Wells went to the First Circuit Court and they ruled in their favor. The Assessor stated that they went to the Supreme Court to appeal the decision and they never heard the case, the time expired and the companies were returned their monies they were putting in escrow. He stated that some things changed for next year on how they assessed Brine Wells and how the reports need to be submitted. He further stated that the Parish is still collecting about the same as last year. He stated that he had a substantial reassessment last year which made up for some of the losses in personal property. The Assessor further stated that they will collect \$21,075,000 for the Parish and last year they collected \$21,466,000 a difference of \$370,000.
5. Police Juror Jeff Naquin offered a motion, seconded by Mr. Chris Carter, "THAT, the Police Jury approve and rule in favor of the Assumption Parish Assessor's Office for the 2021 tax roll and state that no formal complaints were received." The motion was unanimously adopted. (resolution attached)
6. Police Juror Irving Comeaux offered a motion, seconded by Mr. Michael Dias, "THAT, the Police Jury approve the minutes of August 25, 2021." The motion was unanimously adopted.
7. President Patrick Johnson opened the meeting to the public to receive comments questions or concerns regarding matters on the agenda. He recognized Don Breaux, who stated that he was employed with Entergy for years and was supervisor of major hurricanes. He then stated that Hurricane Ida will go down as the worst to hit Louisiana in history. He then commended the OHSEP Director and his staff for a job well done during Hurricane Ida. The entire Police Jury staff was commended for their perspective roles. Following three (3) calls, there were no comments received.
8. President Patrick Johnson stated that the Finance Committee met and recommended the following matters: payment of the bills submitted through September 3, 2021, accepted the bid of \$72,950 submitted by Postlethwaite & Netterville, APAC for RFP for audit services, renew the agreement with Business & Career Solutions Center, Work Connection, Inc. and authorize the President to sign the necessary documents, authorize extreme emergency declaration for Mosquito Abatement Aerial LLC spraying, and accept lowest quote submitted and authorize the President to sign the contract and cancellation of all events scheduled at the APCC through December 31, 2021.
9. Police Juror Jamie Ponville offered a motion, seconded by Mr. Michael Dias, "THAT, the Police Jury approve the Finance Committee Report as presented." The motion was unanimously adopted. (resolutions attached)
10. President Patrick Johnson recognized Engineering Committee Chairman Irving Comeaux who stated that the committee met and recommended the following matters: authorized to apply for a permit for a protection levee behind Gerald St. and received an update on the Coronavirus, the Disaster Recovery Grants and Hurricane Ida.
11. Police Juror Irving Comeaux offered a motion, seconded by Mr. Myron Matherne, "THAT, the Police Jury approve the Engineering/Grants Committee report as presented." The motion was unanimously adopted.

12. President Patrick Johnson recognized Sarah Crochet, LA Rural Ambulance Alliance, who presented a brief summary of what the grant providers. She stated that they are relocating and they wanted to benefit the community therefore, they considered the Parish Government. She proceeded to state that the grant provides three (3) TV's, microphones, camera, etc., a full zoom set up. She stated that it has a 3 yr. license. In response, Police Juror Ron Alcorn stated that this would be zoom equipment for the Chambers for public meetings but the concern was responding to public comments during the live streaming. He then asked that she elaborate on that matter. In response, Ms. Crochet stated that live comments can be turned off in the setting. In response, the Secretary-Treasurer stated that live comments can't be denied during a meeting. A brief discussion was then held regarding comments during live streaming. The ADA stated that with this apparatus, it would be just streaming the meeting for the public to be aware not for participation. In response to how LA Rural Ambulance Alliance benefits from the donation, Ms. Crochet stated that they gain nothing from the donation but stated that they have the opportunity to give and that's what they're doing. She stated that they have also donated one to the Pierre Part Fire Department. She added that their grant is \$1 million and she has 13 hubs to set up across the State of Louisiana. Ms. Crochet stated that she has 3 yrs. to complete the grant and there's no cost to the Parish. In response, she stated that Ms. Donna Newchurch has agreed to cover any charges after the 3 yr. period. In response to the grant paying for broadband connection, Ms. Crochet stated it wouldn't. The OHSEP Director informed the Jury that the Police Jury doesn't have high speed internet and would have to look into getting something faster. Following a brief discussion, the committee agreed to accept the donation and asked that she provide the warranty details.
13. Police Juror Jamie Ponville offered a motion, seconded by Mr. Ron Alcorn, "THAT, the Police Jury approve and accept the \$50,000 grant for Zoom Equipment for the Police Jury Chambers." The motion was unanimously adopted.
14. President Patrick Johnson recognized Ms. Beryl Amedee, State Representative, who stated that she will be presenting a report from the Legislative Session for 2021. She stated that this year they had a regular legislative session called a fiscal year only session because it's the only session they can entertain bills that would increase taxes or fees. It's a shorter session allowing them to focus more on the budget and a limit on the number of bills that are not budget related bills. She stated that the session started on April 12, 2021 and ended on June 10, 2021. The reason for so many bills was due to COVID, some were from last year. Ms. Amedee stated that they wanted to simplify the tax code to make Louisiana more competitive among other states, invest more into critical infrastructure, help students recover after missing so many class days, beef up election integrity because of headlines in many other states and support pandemic recovery efforts to bring businesses back. They passed some common sense tax reform that lowers the rate for individuals and businesses giving some tax relief and move Louisiana from 42 to 38 on tax foundation of ranking. House Bill 514 was passed to help fund road and bridge projects and was passed without raising any taxes. They allocated some special funds to help students that were behind catch up through tutoring and remedial programs due to the shortage in school time. She stated that bills were also passed to help with the election process and the purchase of new voting machines. She stated that every year they pass a budget and by law it has to balance. This year they broke a record with the total State Budget being \$43.3 Billion, the highest ever. The largest portion of the budget is going to healthcare (\$18.2 billion) and education (\$10.1 billion). The State General Fund is \$9.1 billion which \$7.2 billion is predominantly for health and education. This year's budget also includes \$3 billion for Federal COVID Relief funding and \$1.4 billion of that has been unallocated in the current budget and will be moved around next year. Tax reform measures were passed in 4 bills. The first two (2) bills have to do with personal income tax and individual income, SB 159. The other two (2) have to do with corporate income and corporate franchise tax. One will reduce the income tax bracket and the rates of those brackets and the other bill deals with corporate franchise tax and eventually as state revenue thresholds are met the corporate franchise tax will eventually go away. Three (3) bills were passed in criminal justice, HB 46 reduces the time a person can actually be held in jail without being charged. HB 32 allows an offender who completes a masters or bachelor degree while in custody to earn a good time credit. HB 106 requires that a defendant be informed of certain rights and consequences before the plead guilty. HB 457 insurance reform was passed which is of importance this week. It enacts standards of conduct for claim adjusters that their reports be truthful, require appropriate care when dealing with the elderly. HB 585 requires a field adjuster's report be given to the policy holder within 15 days of the request. HB 577 establishes a 5 yr. trial program to increase the market options for residential flood policies. Ms. Amedee stated that 2 bills relative to education were also passed, M J Foster Promise Award which is nicknamed Tops for adults. It's geared to adults that have not received a college degree and would like to attend a community or technical college if qualified. The Steve Carter Literacy Program gives additional funding to enhance literacy rates. HB 415 allows tourist commissions to create tourism recovery in improvement districts if 2/3 of the businesses within the district agree. HB 261 requires background checks of potential civil service board appointees. HB 41 stated civil service employees who resign or retire due to medical conditions can be reemployed after receiving clearance from their physician. HB 622 the Office of Rural Development within the government administration will be assigned the issues of broadband, water quality and sewer treatment. She stated that they passed a bill relative to the restructure of Wildlife & Fisheries that removes the criminal penalty for low level fishing violations and changed some fees for commercial licenses, vessel registration, etc. She also stated that in 2020 the unemployment

fund was in good and well-funded until COVID happened, it was depleted and a loan was made from the federal government to keep the unemployment going. She then stated that a resolution was passed that suspended the trigger law so the business tax would not increase. The unemployment benefits were increased by \$30. HB 15 creates a crime for staging a motor vehicle accident. A bill was passed to raise the minimum age for 18 to 21 to purchase tobacco. A bill was also passed to require the singing or playing of the national anthem prior to an athletic event at a public funded venue. They experienced their first veto override session for two days but didn't accomplish anything. Constitutional amendments will be on the ballot this fall and next year. Following those bill updates she stated the next session is a special session that will take place in February. It will be a redistricting/reapportionment session. She presented the following web site that was established by the State for redistricting ([redist.legis.la.gov](http://redist.legis.la.gov)). In response, Ms. Amedee stated that sales tax should be appropriately distributed based on locations. She stated that the specific funds from HB 514 are earmarked for big projects that benefit the State overall and frees up funds to fund the smaller projects that are locally. Police Juror Irving Comeaux thanked Ms. Amedee for her assistance in the Bayou L'Ourse Community. He explained the difference in the area relative to SLECA and Entergy electric connections. President Patrick Johnson thanked Ms. Amedee on behalf of the Police Jury for the report and assistance that has been rendered to Assumption Parish as a whole.

15. President Patrick Johnson recognized Police Juror Leroy Blanchard, who stated that everyone is aware of the information that is sent out by Guy Cormier nightly relative to the GOHSEP situational report. He stated that in light of the communication issues that was experienced following Hurricane Ida, he would like the Police Jury to consider having a parish level situational report created for all the agencies to keep all of the Jurors updated as to what is on there, and if there is anything on there that the Juror is not aware of they can learn about it and get it corrected. He also stated that it would serve as a record for future events and assist with management. He then stated that this document is basically a record of the meetings that are held at 4 p.m. daily however, it would be available for pick up by any Juror or other agency updating you of what went on during the entire event up to that point. In response, the OHSEP Director stated that it will require people to do the report. He stated that an additional person would have to be hired to do it, have it tasked to another department that has the resources to do it. He further explained the lack of staff and stated that it's a matter of funding. In response, Police Juror Jeff Naquin stated that following this event there will be several things the Jury needs to look at but he stated that they don't need to see a situational report because he remembers everything from the beginning. Police Juror Leroy Blanchard stated that if you viewed the GOHSEP report, you know it didn't take hours to do and what's submitted to the State daily can be added daily to the situational report. In response, the OHSEP Director stated that he's gathering that more details are being requested for the report which comes under public relations. He also stated that he would like to have that type of document but after hearing the budget crisis of the parish it may not be able to happen. He further stated that a lot of times additional tasks are being put on people and it gets placed in their priority. Police Juror Leroy Blanchard stated that he's not requesting a document for public information it's for Jury information. He explained that for 3 days he was unable to get on the conference call because of lack of cell service, no power etc. and through conversation with other Jurors the information he learned from other Jurors should have been captured on the report for other entities. He gave examples of updates such as Waterworks no updates, no communications with Napoleonville Fire Department, Bayou L'Ourse had no communication with the Sheriff's Office, etc. and stated that for the future we can't allow this to happen again. In response, President Patrick Johnson stated that this is a good point being made and stated that he has spoken with the Secretary-Treasurer relative to some of the same but it doesn't have to be decided tonight. A brief discussion was then held regarding the poor communication three (3) days following the hurricane. Police Juror Ron Alcorn stated that his take away was not being able to communicate and not having information to bring back to the residents when asked. He then stated that he could recall having a public relations person, may not have been an official title but someone wore the hat. In response, the Secretary-Treasurer stated that she wore that hat but the role was taken away from her by the OHSEP Director and the Grants Coordinator. Police Juror Irving Comeaux stated that he experienced three (3) hurricanes and had communications in all except this one.
16. Police Juror Jeff Naquin offered a motion, seconded by Mr. Irving Comeaux, 'THAT, the Police Jury approve to accept the low bid submitted for the demolition, removal and disposal of the derelict structure located at 405 Maple St. in the Labadieville Community.' The motion was unanimously adopted.
17. Police Juror Jamie Ponville offered a motion, seconded by Mr. Myron Matherne, 'THAT, the Police Jury approve to accept the low bid submitted for the demolition, removal and disposal of the derelict structure located at 3178 Hwy 1 in the Labadieville Community.' The motion was unanimously adopted

18. Police Juror Jamie Ponville offered a motion, seconded by Mr. Irving Comeaux, "THAT, there being no further business to come before the Assumption Parish Police Jury, the meeting be adjourned." The motion was unanimously adopted.
